The Stirling Society

The Stirling Society approached the Trustees in 2008 with a request to hold their collection. After it was ascertained that this was photographs and not aircraft parts, we felt honoured to be asked.

The then gentleman in charge, Bunny Mason, was of the old school and declined to deal with me insisting on a man! Peter duly took over the arrangements and on Sunday May 31st, 2009 Dame Vera Lynn, Patron of the Society, came to unveil the plaque. We took them to Elveden for lunch beforehand and were joined by Lord Iveagh who was pleased to meet Dame Vera and kindly treated us to lunch. She officially unveiled the plaque in a short ceremony and met the many members of the society. She is a delightful lady.

Earlier this year we were approached by the Stirling Society and asked if they could meet on the 10th anniversary of the unveiling and we were pleased to oblige.

Coincidentally we had been given a display case by the National Horseracing Museum that just fitted in front of their photographic display. What to put in it? Gary Ewington came up with the idea of a model Stirling and offered to make it. He researched the plane numbers stationed at Mildenhall and made the model now installed in the case with the many accessories and a photo of Dame Vera in 2009.

Thanks to Gary for the idea and the time he has spent making the exhibit. We hope they are as pleased as we are.

News Release – British Library makes their mark

On Friday 26 April 2019, pop-up exhibitions on the origins, means and future of writing will simultaneously launch in over 20 partner libraries around the UK, including at Ipswich, Bury St Edmunds, Lowestoft and Felixstowe libraries in tandem with the opening of *Writing: Making Your Mark* at the British Library in London.

Through images of carved stone inscriptions, medieval manuscripts and early printed works, the family-focused pop-up displays will span five millennia and five continents to deconstruct the act of writing and consider its future in the digital age.

The free pop-up exhibition will be augmented with accompanying events and an interactive learning trail, enabling visitors of all ages to engage in a nationwide conversation exploring the act of writing through the Living Knowledge Network and their hashtag #MakingYourMark.

The Living Knowledge Network is an innovative partnership of public libraries based in major cities and towns working in collaboration with the British Library, the National Library of Scotland and the National Library of Wales. The Network shares resources, skills and ideas, promoting the enduring values of libraries.

The tour dates are as follows:

Thursday 26th April – 17th May – Ipswich Library

Friday 31st May – 21st June – Bury St Edmunds Library

Friday 5th July – 26th July – Lowestoft Library

Friday 9th August – Tuesday 27th August – Felixstowe Library
